

What can BTMed do for me?

- BTMed offers a free medical screening specifically designed to detect health problems arising from construction work at a Department of Energy facility.
- BTMed screens for illnesses that are not work-related but might be treated by your doctor, like those associated with blood pressure, cholesterol, or diabetes.
- The Department of Energy has authorized repeat exams for former workers. These exams are available approximately every three years.
- The medical exam can help find health problems before it is too late. ***This screening program has already saved lives.***
- By taking part in BTMed, you can find out if you have a compensable illness. The Department of Labor administers the Energy Employees Occupational Illness Compensation Program Act (EEOICPA). For more information on EEOICPA, call toll-free 1-866-888-3322.



What is BTMed?

The Building Trades National Medical Screening Program (BTMed) provides a *FREE* medical screening for former construction/subcontractor workers who worked on a Department of Energy (DOE/AEC) site. BTMed is coordinated by CPWR – The Center for Construction Research and Training and is supported by North America’s Building Trades Unions, AFL-CIO with support from state and local Building & Construction Trades Councils.

Am I eligible?

If you worked construction (for either the prime or subcontractors) at any time on a DOE site, then you may be eligible to participate. To find out, call toll-free at 1-800-866-9663.

What are the possible materials I may have been exposed to on a DOE site?

Possible materials include:

- Asbestos
- Beryllium
- Cadmium
- Chromium
- Fumes, vapors or dusts
- Lead or other heavy metals
- Mercury
- Nickel
- Noise
- Radiation
- Silica
- Solvents or degreasers



How does BTMed work?

BTMed consists of two steps:

STEP ONE: Work History Interview

A specially trained building trades worker or work site expert conducts your work history interview to determine hazardous materials you may have encountered. The interview can be conducted in-person, over the telephone, or on-line.

STEP TWO: Medical Exam

You receive a free screening exam to test for illnesses that may have been caused by these exposures. Following the exam, you receive a letter indicating any medical findings. BTMed cannot pay for additional medical treatment, but we can assist you with referrals for further medical care.

All results are kept confidential.

How do I enroll?



When and where can I schedule a medical examination?

The medical exam is scheduled after you complete the work history interview. BTMed has more than 200 credentialed medical providers located across the country to serve our participants.

The medical exam may include:

- Physical exam
- Blood tests
- Lung function test
- Chest x-ray
- Audiogram (hearing test)
- Fecal occult blood test
